A Message from the Vice Principal, Kerin Kelleher

The Climate at Holmes

How is the weather at Holmes Junior High as we welcome in the New Year? There are many, many variables that contribute to a positive school climate. A positive school climate happens when many people guide students toward respectful interactions with each other. I often tell students, staff and parents that we work very hard at Holmes to keep our weather sunny, safe and healthy for our 7th, 8th and 9th graders. Each day is a new opportunity to develop positive friendships and build safe connections that will sustain students in their future years of schooling. During this past fall students and staff participated in two key experiences to help keep our campus safe for students.

On October 14, all 8th graders participated in the "Teen Truth Live" presentation that was sponsored by the Davis Police Department, the City of Davis and DJUSD. Emerson and Harper students also experienced this assembly later the same day. Director Erahm Christopher began his presentation with the statement, "My friends and I developed this film to challenge you to discuss bullying and its relationship to school violence. Our goal is to help you find ways to prevent violence from happening at your school. This message is too important to be left unsaid." Mr. Christopher challenged students through film and discussion to think and act when they see examples of bullying on campus. He helped students see that they can have a tremendous impact on eliminating bullying, one action at a time. Mr. Christopher urged students not to hurt or isolate their fellow classmates at school. He reminded them that we should all pay attention to how our actions impact others. He also reminded them that all students are coping with the stresses of school, relationships, and parents. He challenged them to really see the students sitting around them as people just like themselves, who want to be treated with

respect and kindness. His powerful message was a graphic reminder that we can all make our school safe from bullying.

One simple way to remind students of this special event from last October is our orange wrist bands that are filtering out among our campus. You may see your student bring home an orange wrist band which means that someone at school has recognized them for doing something to help stop unkindness on campus. Holmes School Ambassadors is another very important program that once again we support here at Holmes. Deanna Leveque has been our past coordinator and this year Joanna Littell, our counselor, has taken the lead for us. She organized an off-campus training day for 65 students on October 18. The program is designed to build alliances between the student leaders and Holmes staff, to educate the student leaders about bullying and nonviolent intervention, and to empower the student leaders to minimize bullying and violence among their peers. By doing this we hope to reduce bullying and social mistreatment, improve school climate, and ultimately decrease administration time on disciplinary issues. Key Holmes staff will volunteer to be "family leaders" and to lead a group of approximately 10 student leaders throughout the school year. Family leaders meet approximately twice a month during regular class time which will sustain commitment, sharpen awareness, and increase reporting of unsafe behavior on campus.

Parents are always invited to our monthly School Climate meetings to help us work together to support student efforts that keep our weather here at Holmes sunny and pleasant. Our next meeting is January 31, 2011 at 3:40 p.m. in the Holmes Office.

Counselors' Corner

Student Achievement

The first quarter of the 2010-11 school year ended on October 29. First- and second-quarter grades are used to determine the first semester grades, which appear on student permanent records. The first semester ends on January 21, 2011. Low grades are usually linked to poor study skills, lack of organization, assignments not being completed and turned in, and inadequate preparation for tests. Here are some suggestions to increase and maintain grade performance:

For Students

1. Attend school every day, be on time to every class, and make the most of class time.
2. Take responsibility for your grades; do your homework every day.
3. Be organized: Keep your backpack and locker neat, use a 3-ring binder with folders/dividers, and keep your homework in a consistent place.
4. Write your assignments in your planner every period.
5. Break up large assignments into smaller parts and set reasonable deadlines to complete each part. Use a large wall calendar to plot and plan your schedule and progress.
6. Get the phone number of at least one study buddy in each class that you can call to clarify assignments and refer to your teachers' websites.
7. Check StudentConnect often. If you do not have your password, see the school registrar before or after school or at lunch.
8. Make an appointment with your teacher if you have concerns or need help.
9. Utilize a weekly progress report to monitor grade improvement (available in the counseling office).

For Parents

1. Foster growth and independence by encouraging your child to accept responsibility for his/her homework and grades.
2. Provide encouragement and support.
3. Maintain a regular bedtime and provide a healthy diet. See that phones, computers, electronic games, TVs are turned off at bedtime. Consider collecting your child's cell phone at bedtime so that his/her sleep is not interrupted by text messages. Sleep loss due to texting during the night is emerging as a factor in poor academic performance.
4. Provide an appropriate setting and schedule to complete homework.
5. Review planner nightly to make sure homework has been completed. Monitor academic progress with weekly progress reports that your child completes and use ParentConnect.
6. Provide a large calendar to track long-term assignments and mark due dates.
7. Contact teachers via email, voice mail or written note.
8. After contacting and problem-solving with teachers, consider contacting your child's counselor if academic improvement continues to be a concern.

Attendance

Absences: Report absences at 757-5453, extension 201 or 757-5445 as early in the day as possible. If your child is ill for 5 or more days, please bring a note from a medical professional verifying the illness.

Extended illnesses: If your child is absent for 3 days or more due to illness, a homework request can be made through the Registrar, Judy Stafford, at 757-5450, extension 115, on the

morning of the third day. Until that time, your child can call his or her study buddies and check the teachers' websites.

Leaving campus during school

hours: If your child must leave school, have your child bring a note signed by the parent or guardian to the attendance office before school, stating the time and the reason that the student must leave.

Extended absence for travel: If your child will be absent for more than 5 days due to travel, contact the Davis School for Independent Study at 757-5333 to arrange for travel study. Please also notify the attendance office.

Change of information

If you have any changes to your child's or family's information (telephone number, address, email, medical insurance, doctor/dentist name and number, emergency contact, etc.) contact Registrar Judy Stafford by phone or email.

Academic Talent Search Testing

In summer of 2011, Sacramento State's Academic Talent Search (ATS) will offer 4th through 9th grade students the opportunity to take accelerated classes in a collegiate environment. The ATS qualifying exam will be given for students in grades 6-9 at Holmes on Thursday, February 17 at 3:30 p.m. Sign up forms, fee waiver forms (the fee is \$15), and additional information are available in the counseling office and at

Important Scrip Update

As of December 1, Nugget Market rolled out their new Scrip Card Program. Armed with your new Nugget Scrip card, you will still be able to support Holmes by directing Nugget to contribute a portion of your shopping bill to your PTA **at no cost to you**. The change does, however, require action on all our parts to ensure that we don't lose this critical source of revenue:

1. Since the new program already started, your old card will no longer be honored.
2. Contact Scrip Coordinator Julia Grim to get your new card. You cannot get a new card at the store. Julia will get you your new card in time for the holidays and will do everything in her power to minimize the inconvenience to you, but she needs you to contact her first. Glen_julia_julian@sbcglobal.net or 753-8932 (eves or message). *If I have the cards in time, I will set up a table and make cards available at the school dance on Dec. 10 and at the Jazz Band/Choir concert on Dec. 14.*
3. You must register your new card online at www.nuggetmarket.com/community. When registering, you can choose up to four organizations/beneficiaries.
4. Use your new Nugget card every time you shop. The new cards carry no cash value- no more worries about lost or stolen cards!

Nugget has adopted a "tiered contribution structure"; the more you shop, the greater the percentage that Nugget will contribute:

- 1% on monthly purchases up to \$300
- 2% on monthly purchases between \$301-\$500
- 3% on monthly purchases between \$501 and \$600
- 4% on monthly purchases over \$600.

Times are challenging for all, and the new structure *will* generate less in terms of individual contributions. Your PTA's 2010-2011 school year budget was developed assuming that we would be able to generate \$5,400 in contributions by participating in the Nugget Scrip Program- **we will not reach our target unless we increase participation!** Overall, Scrip represents roughly 40% of Holmes PTA's budget, which is used to support many of the great opportunities that Holmes provides our students. *Make a difference - use your scrip cards when you shop!*

"SECRETS"

On Monday, December 6, students will have the opportunity to participate in an assembly featuring a performance called "Secrets", the Kaiser Permanente's award-winning HIV/AIDS and sexually transmitted infection (STI) prevention program.
