March News and Updates

I would like you to invite you to our Open House on Thursday, March 31. Visitors will view student projects, listen to the music of the Holmes Band, purchase books at the Book Fair and watch students participate in activities in the gym. If you visit our Science Labs, Library, Computer Labs, Gym Complex, Home Economics Room and Industrial Arts Facilities, you will see what our wonderful students are accomplishing.

STAR Testing:

Seventh graders throughout the state will be writing an essay for the STAR writing assessment on March 1, and then our whole school will be gearing up for the state standards tests later in the spring. Between April 18 and May 6 students will be taking the nationally-normed California Standards Tests in English/language arts, math, U.S. history and science. As all schools in the state will be testing during this testing window, at this time we are uncertain when the testing company will have the results returned to us. Although the state uses this testing for accountability purposes and general achievement information, our school staff finds the individual and group information very valuable. It tells us where relative strengths and weaknesses are in our instructional programs and when we are hitting those targets. For example, Holmes' science scores have risen steadily over the years. This data tells us that our instructional methods are sound.

Consider Being a PTA Volunteer Next School Year

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Principal's Message

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The test results are also one of the measures we use when considering individual student's placement in certain classes. The following are a few suggestions to help prepare your student for the testing:

- Please do not schedule appointments or trips during this time. Students not testing during class testing times will be testing in a mixed-class setting during makeup times. Research has found that students do their best testing in their own classroom with their own teacher.
- Try to get into a routine that includes early bedtime, breakfast and arriving to school on time. Students arriving late when a class is testing will not be allowed into the classroom until that section of testing is complete.
- Encourage your student to do his/her best and to use the opportunity to practice test-taking skills, which are increasingly important as students look forward to passing the high school exit exam and applying for college, trade schools, or employment.

It's become increasingly clear that our schools will be facing challenging times in the months ahead. Our district is experiencing declining student enrollment. Together, these factors could reduce our school district budget next year by as much as \$6 million.

This significant decrease in funding will, inevitably, impact services, programs, and staffing for our schools. As parents, teachers, staff members, and administrators, our job is to make sure that our educational mission remains our top priority. As a community, we must keep our focus on our students and their welfare.

Times like these cause us to pull together. I ask your patience and understanding as we navigate through the difficult days ahead. To the fullest extent our resources permit, we will place first the welfare of the students we serve.

Thank you for supporting and motivating your children to make the most of their learning experiences here at Holmes!

I'm sure you've noticed PTAs tend to operate more quietly at the junior high level than they do at the elementary school level. Be assured, junior high PTAs are still a vital part of school. To prove my point, here are some of our budget details: This year the Holmes PTA is budgeted to raise over \$31,000. Of that \$31,000, under \$1000 is spent on administrative expenses and \$1500 goes to pay our dues to the State PTA organization. That leaves \$28,500 available for the benefit of the Holmes students and families. Annually, Holmes PTA uses the money raised to support Holmes programs such as: library books and materials, WEB, Safe School Ambassadors, International Day, staff education, parent education, campus beautification, Red Ribbon Week, Toy Shop, Pi Week, and science supplies for dissection and meal worm projects.

PTA also helps teachers with individual requests for program support. This year, the PE, Home Ec/Health and Computer Science departments purchased new equipment. The Art department purchased new art supplies. The Social Studies department registered for the National Geography Bee and the Math department registered for the Math Counts competition. Additionally, PTA is supporting class-wide field trips at all grade levels, relating to social studies (7th and 8th grade) or PE (9th grade) curriculum, and is also funding a motivational speaker for the entire student body.

PTA is happy to provide "hospitality". We treat the Holmes staff to a wonderful lunch three times a year and we help with events like Career Day and school registration. PTA also serves the Holmes families through listserv announcements, the monthly newsletter, the PTA website, and coordination of escrip and Nugget scrip cards – all of which are maintained by PTA volunteers.

PTA volunteers are the backbone of a strong PTA. With your participation, we can continue to help the Holmes teachers provide the best education possible for our children. I hope next year you will become a PTA volunteer!

SEXting...now that I've got your attention

In 2005, the term "sexting" was first published in a British newspaper, *The Daily Telegraph*. Since 2005, there has been a proliferation of sexting scandals that has included celebrities such as football star Brett Favre, golfer Tiger Woods, teen idols Vanessa Hudgens and Hilary Duff. There have also been scandals involving high school and junior high school students. Consequences have included the humiliation that Tiger Woods experienced to the suicide of eighteen year old Jessica Logan. While the sending and receiving of sexts caused Tiger Woods serious problems with regard to his marriage and corporate sponsors, his sexting activity was not deemed illegal as it took place between consenting adults. For adolescents, however, the creation and distribution of sexually explicit photographs is considered child pornography in most states.

The National Campaign to Prevent Teen and Unplanned Pregnancy (2009) conducted a survey of over a 1000 adolescents and concluded that the use of cell phones and computers to send and receive sexually explicit photos and to send and receive sexually suggestive messages is a phenomenon that is becoming more prevalent and troublesome in our country. This study found that 20% of all teens (ages 13-19) created and distributed nude or suggestive photos of themselves and 39% of all teens have transmitted sexually suggestive messages. Teens who live in Davis are sexting.

Problems further arise as many sexts are eventually shared with others than the intended recipient. In the case of Jessica Logan, Jessica created a nude photo of herself and texted it to her boyfriend. When Jessica and her boyfriend broke up, he distributed the photograph to other girls in their school via text messaging. Jessica was humiliated, harassed by classmates, and became so despondent that she killed herself. Other potential recipients can include friends, family, teachers and future employers. College admission committee members are now looking

up applicants on websites such as MySpace and Facebook to gather information on students; this information can negatively affect an applicant's admissions chances. As such, pictures posted to cell phones and forwarded to these social networks may result in damaging consequences to adolescents on many fronts.

Why adolescents sext is quite disturbing: Many send images to be flirtatious and some send them as a joke phones (The National Campaign to Prevent Teen and Unplanned Pregnancy, 2009). Some teenagers and young adults exhibit low self-esteem and are seeking attention from a hopeful admirer, a potential boyfriend or even a stranger on the Internet. Coercion is becoming more and more problematic in "sextortion" cases. Sextortion is a form of blackmail when one party threatens harm to another unless they send explicit photos or have sex with them.

Unfortunately, many teens and young adults are unaware of the potential legal harm and emotional consequences if caught creating, possessing or forwarding/distributing sexts. This is especially true of teenagers who often do not think before they act. Emotional consequences include anxiety, depression, low self esteem, and sometimes suicide. Legal consequences are relatively new and as cell phone technology is becoming more affordable, this sexting phenomenon is becoming more prevalent. For intervention and educational reasons, more parents, educators and health professionals need to understand sexting so they can inform adolescents of the possible dangers to help prevent the negative psychological and physical consequences which can ensue. The bottom line...please talk with your teens about sexting and its ramifications!

Working with your child's coaches and other mentors to discourage substance use

One of the biggest deterrents to a child using substances is involvement in meaningful activities that are rewarding and help provide stimulation and structure. Many students, however, justify using alcohol and drugs to relax as long as they manage their responsibilities. So you may be surprised at the number of athletes who drink and smoke before, during or after their sport season.

Did you know that the Davis Joint Unified School District has a specific policy proscribing action by coaches with respect to athletes using? The policy can be found at <http://www.djUSD.net/district/docs/sports-forms/sports-forms>. Many coaches may not even be aware of this policy, and you can help support them in their efforts by bringing it to their attention, or asking if you can help communicate any information to other parents.

Coaches, as with other mentors, have a major influence on our kids – they are one reason we encourage kids to participate and spend as much time as they do doing sports. No coach wants to lose an athlete because of a rule violation, especially when that kid's behavior may be a sign of distress and sports may be the only thing holding them together. Coaches can do a lot short of kicking a kid off the team for substance use by just sharing their feelings and making their expectations clear: that substance use by teens is never okay. As one Davis coach recently said at a parent meeting, "You

are an athlete before during and after practice, and before during and after the season. You represent your team, your sport and your fellow athletes. There is no time it is OK to use substances."

Davis Parents Do supports the district to implement the policy and to follow the lead of coaches who have creative solutions to intervening in appropriate ways with the athletes that care about their opinions. As a parent, you can ask your children's coaches how they deal with substance use, on or off season, and how they communicate their position to their athletes. And, be sure to offer them support when they do take the risk of helping a kid out by intervening.

Discussion Topic with Your Teen: Ask your teens if they know what their team's policy is with respect to using substances and whether they think it is enforced. If not, ask them why they think it isn't, and what the consequences would be if it were. Ask them whether they think it's important to the team for the coach to enforce the policy, or for themselves personally. Finally, if you think your teens feel safe enough, ask them if they feel any pressure to use with their fellow athletes in any environment. Problem-solve together on how to handle the pressure if they are approached, or if they see another athlete using.
